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Fight for Independence: oin the atriot Militia-

Did you know that everyone that fought here at the August 19, 1780 battle of Musgrove Mill was an American? The only difference being which side they fought for the Patriots or the Loyalists.

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The 200 Patriots that fought here were all militiamen, volunteer soldiers who had to bring their own clothing, weapons, and gear to the battlefield. In this brochure you will discover what it was like to be part of the Patriot Militia here at the battle of Musgrove Mill.

Dressing for Battle

Since Patriot Militiamen were volunteer soldiers nothing was given to them so they had to wear the same clothes they wore every day and had to bring their own hunting rifles. If you were part of the Patriot militia today you would be wearing the same clothes you have on right now.

To Cross or Not

In 1780 there were no bridges in this area of South Carolina, so you were only able to cross rivers at fords, (an area of a river shallow enough you could walk across). But when the water was too high you were stuck on one side of the river and had to wait for the water to go down. There were two river fords across the Enoree River at Musgrove Mill.

Patriot militias in South Carolina often rode horses to battles and dismounted to fight. This let them travel around quickly and also helped them get away when being chased by the British. To get to Musgrove Mill they had to ride 40 miles in just one night.
